

You will receive this newsletter after we celebrated our nation's independence on July 4th. We were honored to have Pete Rosie as our Grand Marshal. Pete is the recipient of the 2018 Military Order of the Purple Heart Patriot of the Year for the Nation. The parade was well represented with over 30 entries! I was very impressed with the number of young families that I saw at City Hall for the festivities and along the parade route. Last month, I reported that the City Council appointed members to the Street CIP Project. This group of volunteers spent many hours in weekly meetings reviewing the status of our streets and resourcing expert advice from our City Engineer. They turned in their report at the July 16th Regular City Council meeting. The Council will now decide on funding possibilities and make decisions on the best options for our City. We need to ensure our streets are maintained. They are the gateway to the City and your home.

The Council members appointed citizens to help with the selection of a new Fire Chief. We will soon be reviewing resumes and conducting interviews to fill this critical appointment. Our interim Fire Chief and current Fire Marshal, Tim Zelnak, is doing a great job keeping the Department moving forward.

We are still in the process of considering two major projects in our City – the Springbrook Senior Living Campus on the property adjacent to Home Depot and a Quick Trip fuel and food store on the corner of Eisenhower and I-35. I encourage you all to stay informed on these two projects.

Looking for a way to serve? We always need citizen involvement in the life of our City. If you are interested in serving the community, we have developed an "Application to serve on a City Board/Commission/Committee." Bexar County WCID #10 UPDATES ITS WEBSITE

The Water District Board voted in its June meeting to update its Website. Benson Design will be developing the new website. Mr. Benson, President of Benson Design, gave a presentation to the Board of Directors about the many features the new website will have.

A temporary website was brought on line until the complete, new website is ready. The new website will be interactive. There will be many new features. The site will have special areas for both commercial and residential customers to find information specific to each group. Each of these sections will have rate information for water and sewer. Information about rebate opportunities will also be available.

An area on the site will have information about WCID #10's water rights, storage capacity and pumping capacity. The new site will have dates of Water Board Meetings, who is on the Water Board and how to contact them. It will also have a listing and pictures of the employees of the Water District and contact information for the General Manager. There will be a section that gives hints/suggestions for water conservation.

The new site will allow citizens to pay their water bill on-line.

Instructions for paying will be in the "Pay On-line" section. It will be convenient and safe to make payments on-line.

Other sections of the new website will be informational links for live radar, 7-day weather forecasts, Edward Aquifer Authority, etc. The entire Water District's Policy and Procedures Manual will be on the new site. Reports about water quality that the District has to submit will be on the site as well. One of the sections will show the current Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), and it will also show where the District will be working. That will allow citizens to know if and when their neighborhood, alley or street is due to be under construction by WCID #10. Bid information for construction and other projects will also be on the new site.

These are just a few of the features that citizens will have access to on the new website. The new website will be complete and operational by the time citizens get the August newsletter. Use the old web address (bexarcountywcid10.com) to access the new website and all of its features.

The commercial site at the corner of Eisenhauer and IH 35 is primed for new commercial and retail growth. Endura Advisory Group leads an investment team that has invested millions of dollars in the necessary infrastructure to prepare the location for tenants. The 27 acre site is one of the better commercial sites in the metro area with its access to IH 35 and location in Windcrest. Pad sites range in size starting at approximately 1 acre, interior roads are in place providing multiple points of access and movement within the site. The WEDC is working with the Endura Group to attract users including hotels, restaurants, retailers and a possible QuikTrip major operation. The site is one of the few large land parcels left in Windcrest and is critically important to success of that quadrant of the City.

BBQ SAFETY TIPS

I hope everyone had a safe and happy July 4th holiday this year. This month I would like to share some BBQ safety tips, so your BBQ and home does not go up in flames. Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only used outdoor. The grill should be placed at



least 10 feet away from your home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches. Keep children and pets away from the grill area. Never leave your grill unattended.

There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as fuel. If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire. When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

Code Compliance and Enforcement

It's summer and the sun is shining bright! Hopefully everyone is enjoying the outdoors despite the heat. Swimming pools are a great way to stay cool in this heat. Please keep up with the cleaning of your swimming pool to prevent health concerns



and remember, poor maintenance can cause the breeding of mosquitos and unsafe conditions. A reminder...parking of certain commercial vehicles is prohibited near residences at night, (No person shall park any commercial motor vehicle as defined in V.T.C.A., Transportation Code § 621.001 within the city with its engine and/or other mechanical equipment operating within 150 feet of any residence between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.) If planning on any work done to your home or adding any structures to your property, please contact permits department office for required permits. Don't forget to cut/trim your trees obstructing the streets/alley. Accumulating and disposing of garbage and brush prohibited in the alleys and drains.

If you will be parking any (boats, trailers, vehicles, RV etc..)



in your rear yard please make sure it is parked on permanently maintained parking areas constructed of concrete, asphalt or gravel with barriers or permanent curbing to define the parking area.

Summer is almost over and that means children will be going back-to-school and new teen drivers will be too! Remember to share the roads with school buses, pedestrians and bicyclists. Remind your children about stranger danger, pedestrian and bicycle safety, walking safely to school and their awareness of their surroundings. Develop a safety plan and educate them about the importance of their safety.

New teen drivers will be on the roadway as well. Texas laws are in place but can never take the place of strong parental supervision and responsibility! Teen drivers normally crash because of inexperience, distracted driving and/or speed. These crashes spike as they head back to school. Statistics have proven that fatal crash rates of teen drivers is nearly twice as high at night. The majority of these fatal crashes happen between 9 p.m. and midnight. Strong household rules regarding distracted driving, teen passengers, nighttime driving, use of seat belts and cell phone can certainly fill any gaps where state laws cannot. It is the responsibility of the parent or guardian to insure that their child is ready to drive. Parents or guardians can be held responsible and liable for their teen driver's actions in a crash.



Not every teen is ready to drive at the age of 16, so before you hand the keys to your teen driver, be extremely firm, set the rules and be ready to aggressively enforce non-compliance... you will greatly increase their safety and possibly save their life. The most important thing to remember...follow through! Remind your teen driver that driving is a privilege not a right!

Top 5 Ways To Help Your A/C Beat The Heat This Summer!

- 1. Keep your air conditioning (A/C) unit's thermostat set at 78-80 degrees. (Turn thermostat up 3-5 degrees when you're away from home.)
- 2. Use ceiling fans, but turn them off if no one is in the room. (Ceiling fans can make you feel 3-4 degrees cooler than the actual temperature of the room.)
- 3. Use 1-inch pleated A/C filters, and check or replace them once every two weeks. (If you keep your A/C filters clean, your unit doesn't have to work as hard, saving you energy and money.)
- 4. Have your A/C unit serviced once a year by a licensed and bonded heating and A/C professional.
- 5. Seal electrical outlets and switches with foam gaskets. (Approximately 20 percent of the heat that infiltrates from the outside seeps in from the electrical outlets and light switches on exterior walls.)

Debug your Summer Fun with Herbs

Before you run out to buy chemical pesticides for your yard, there are a number of herbs that grow well in our area that are also natural insect repellents.

Summer is in full swing. This is a time of year when we enjoy barbeques, the beach, road trips and longer days. It's also the time of year when mosquitoes, fleas and other bugs are out in force. This year with the



warm winter and wet spring the population of fleas, ticks and mosquitoes is higher than normal.

Before you run out to buy chemical pesticides for your yard, keep in mind that even the creatures we think of as pests play a role in the ecosystem. Chemical pesticides intended for those pesky bugs may also kill beneficial bugs and can even harm pets in some instances.

That doesn't mean you have to let mosquitoes and other pests ruin your summer fun. There are a number of herbs that grow well in our area that are natural insect repellents. Try these tips to keep from being "bugged" this summer.

Basil – Repels flies and mosquitoes. Planting basil in containers or beds by your doors or around outdoor eating areas will help keep flies and mosquitoes away. Crushing basil leaves and rubbing on your skin protects from mosquito bites or you can make an insect repellent spray with basil, water and vodka.

Lavender - Can be used in many of the same ways as basil. Crush the flowers to extract the oil and rub on your skin, plant

near doors and outdoor living areas to keep flies, fleas and mosquitoes away. Making sachets for drawers and closets will help keep moths away from clothes, too.

Lemon balm and lemon grass - Both contain citronella oil which repels mosquitoes. Lemon balm can be crushed and rubbed on the skin to prevent bites. Growing lemon grass near

outdoor living spaces will help keep mosquitoes away from your outdoor fun.

Rosemary - Repels mosquitoes and a variety of insects that are harmful in vegetable gardens. Grow rosemary near outdoor living spaces, mixed into garden or landscape beds or in containers to help keep insects at bay. Adding a sprig of rosemary directly to the grill will further repel mosquitoes and other insects as the scent infuses the smoke from the grill. Like basil, rosemary can be used to make a natural spray repellent.

Mint - Repels flies, fleas and ants. Mint can be invasive so grow it in pots or other contained areas. Like lemon balm, lavender and basil, mint can be rubbed on your skin to keep from being bitten as well as grown near exterior doors and outdoor living spaces.

All these herbs are great additions to your landscape. They're not only drought-tolerant and easy to grow, but they also have wonderful culinary uses and are beautiful in your landscape. Talk about getting bang for your buck!


